Parent Session 5: Benefits of Handwriting

Handwriting stimulates brain circuits responsible for:

- Memory
- Attention
- Motor skills
- Language
- Reading
- Coordination of vision, memory, and fine motor skills.

Develop Fine Motor skills with these Tools/Activities:

- A surface for chalk/markers/magnets/stickers
- Painting
- Beans to pick up and place in a container
- Chemical-free clay/playdough and tools (plastic knives, spoons, toothpicks)
- Paper to tear and crumple
- Tissue paper to roll into balls
- Using tongs to pick up items and put in containers
- Nuts and bolts
- Spray bottles
- Piggy bank and coins
- Using eye droppers
- Putting lids on containers
- Scissors
- Finger puppets
- Manipulating buttons, snaps, and zippers on clothing
- Attaching paperclips to card stock
- Clothes pins to strengthen fingers
- Stringing beads
- Finding the way through paper mazes
- Chop sticks.
- Connecting dots with arrows to form letters.


How to Hold a Pencil


Hold pencil with a light grip.

- 2. First finger rests on top of the pencil.
- 3. Pencil rests against third finger.

Right hand







- 1. Trace
- 2. Copy
- 3. Draw
 - Lines
 - Shapes

The 3 cornerstones of beginning reading:

- 1. Letter Knowledge
 - Recognition
 - Naming
 - Consonants/Vowels
- 2. Awareness of Language/Sound Structure
 - Words
 - Syllables
 - Rimes
 - Phonemes
- 3. Text Awareness (concepts of print/language development)

Text Awareness: Concepts of Print

- Books have parts such as a front and back cover, spine, title page, and table of contents.
- Books are written by authors.
- Pictures are drawn by illustrators.
- Stories have a beginning, middle, and end.
 - Does your child know the meanings of these words?
- Print is used for different purposes.

Text Awareness: Concepts of Print (continued)

- Books are read:
 - For fun
 - To learn about the world
 - To spark our imaginations.
- Text is read from left to right, top to bottom.

Text Awareness: Concepts of Print (continued)

- The relationship between speech, print, and words is:
 - Speech is what we say.
 - Print represents the words we say.
 - Printed words have spaces between them.

Text Awareness: Concepts of Print (continued)

- There is a difference between letters, words, and sentences:
 - Letters represent sounds
 - Words convey meaning.
 - Sentences express a complete thought.
- Punctuation marks signal the end of a sentence:
 - Period (.)
 - Exclamation mark (!)
 - Question mark (?).
